Third Life Taxidermy: Bringing Your Museum's Taxidermy Back to Life... Again (Offsite at Range Riders Museum)

Taxidermy is nearly ubiquitous in Montana's museums, serving as a record not only of the area's natural history but of some of the state's earliest wildlife artists. The craft of taxidermy, however, is obscure enough that museums rarely have the training or resources to properly assess the quality, worth, and future of these pieces. In this workshop, taxidermy specialist and museum professional Jenn Hall will discuss and demonstrate various issues and techniques for mount care including the following topics: Why it matters, taxidermy techniques for the museum professional, and community involvement. Terry Montana and Evelyn Cameron

Evelyn Cameron was a photographer and diarist of the American West, who documented her life as a pioneer near Terry, Montana from the late 1890s onward. She is best known for her photography chronicling the early life of settlers in Eastern Montana, depicting cowboys, shepherders, weddings, river crossings, freight wagons, ranch, work, badlands, coyotes, eagles, and wolves. On the edge of the scenic badlands and the home of the moss agate, the Prairie County Museum and Evelyn Cameron Gallery

house a collection of her works. The museum complex is the essence of the old pioneer life, the way it was lived, how it was endured, and how we thrived in eastern Montana.

Saints and Sinners in Miles City

Presenter, Sharon Moore, Miles City Academy Executive Director

The development progression of western frontier towns was often closely interwoven with the building of churches, bars, and brothels. This tour will start with four of the oldest churches in town (Episcopal, Catholic, Presbyterian, and Methodist) with beautiful stained-glass windows and architecture. They were involved in the taming of a rough and rowdy cowtown. Some of the funding for these churches came from some of the rowdier establishments, including some of the ladies who worked in the brothels, making the history even more complex and interwoven. The tour will conclude with a tour of three bars (Bison, Trails End, and Montana) that have their own historic contribution to the settling of Miles City and interesting architecture and stories to share. Some of the structures on the tour are on the National Register of Historic Places.

The World-Famous Miles City Bucking Horse Sale is intricately woven into the history of the horse in southeastern Montana and the town of Miles City. The event has evolved over time and draws thousands of people to Miles City every year to watch rodeo and experience the western life style. Sit back and enjoy the ride as Wally Badgett gives us the history of this great event.

1:45-3:00 ***Curating Historic Trash: A Case Study of Objects Ejected from a Hot Spring***
Presenter: Colleen Curry, Museum Curator, YNP

Litter bugs are, unfortunately, not a modern phenomenon and even our most special natural places are not exempt. For almost 150 years, Yellowstone National Park has dealt with trash accumulated in historic camps and hotel dumps, as well as in thermal features. On September 15, 2018, for the first time in the park's history, a thermal feature (Ear Spring) ejected items that had been thrown into it by thoughtless individuals for decades. Learn what objects were ejected, how we dated some of them, what they tell us about visitors of certain periods, and how they are being preserved in the park's museum collections.

1:45-3:00 ***Defining the Gray Area Between Roles of Executive Directors, Board Members and Staff***

Join Bill Jones in a conversation about the separate roles of the board, director, and staff, and when and why you need to be careful that lines are not crossed. The Range Riders Museum, the *Miles City Star*, and a former *Star* staff photographer worked together to rescue a rare gem—photographs of the last cattle drive from Texas to Montana in 1995 and re-enacted trail drives from the 1880's-- from storage and dangers of deterioration and disposal. Learn how these partners worked together to preserve and share a collection of photographs taken by a staff photographer of this significant local event. The lessons learned might help you rescue, preserve, and share your own local gems.

In 2016, four museums in Kumamoto, Japan and two museums in Montana, USA began a collaboration built on the strong sister-state relationship between Montana and Kumamoto. What began as a sharing of ideas, scientific knowledge, and training methods evolved into this robust educator's guide highlighting our increased appreciation of our sister-state relationship and shared understanding of earth and space science. The finished curriculum, "Our Home, Our World: Discovering Earth and Space Science in Kumamoto and Montana" was launched in October 2017. Here is the story of that journey and how you can replicate international collaborations in your own communities.

Get up to speed on the best practices for managing your collection! We'll go over the basic policies and procedures that you'll want to have in place for properly maintaining your collection using templates and examples to guide us. Learn what documents and files will help track artifacts and information, and discuss what actions to take to keep your artifacts safe and accessible. Penny Redli successfully gained funding and support for her museum from Stillwater County, gaining the museum status as the official historic records repository for Stillwater County. That status allowed the museum a part time employee and a promise of new space for the expanding archives. Jodie Foley works with local governments to help them preserve their historically significant records. One aspect of that work is fostering relationships between local museums and local governments to preserve historic government records either through training or direct assistance. This session will explore the benefits and challenges of local museum and local government collaboration, and thoughts on how to determine if that route is right for your museum.

Well before Montana's statehood, the Netherlands commenced a rich tradition of cultural preservation. Join us for an illustrated overview of the country's heritage as displayed in its local, regional and national institutions, plus insights on current Dutch museum issues and their possible application in a Montana context. February 10, 1873, the entity destined to become Montana's Department of Livestock began recording Livestock Brands and Marks. Since that time, hundreds of thousands of Montanans, including cattle barons, homesteaders, music teachers, and authors, have recorded their own brand. Each recording tells a story. These stories are vital components to Montana's history, culture, and identity. Zoe Ann will

discuss not only the creation of the Livestock Records, but their amazing Montana legacies.
